



Green building programs and standards are a great resource for greening your projects. Whether applying the programs' green principles to an individual project or to organizational construction and management processes, you will find programs provide the support and structure needed to achieve green standards on a consistent basis. Certification through green building programs provides risk management, independent verification and quality assurance. Choosing the right rating system(s) for your roadmap is critical and will be based on your green goals and desired outcomes. ## CP272 BUILDING A NONPROFIT BUSINESS AROUND DECONSTRUCTION AND BUILDING MATERIALS REUSE

Building materials reuse centers are a local community response to the challenge of construction and demolition debris. They can also help build the local economy. These centers receive donations of salvaged building materials and resell them at deeply discounted prices; they often also provide deconstruct services — an alternative to building demolition. Our United Villages and The Rebuilding Center, in Portland, Oregon, do exactly that, diverting 8 tons of building materials from the landfill every day and earning \$3 million in revenues that create local jobs and support the community. Learn from Assistant Director Chris Bekemeier how you could do the same in your own community. See the concept in action during a site visit to Stardust Building Supplies in Phoenix.
