NOTES TO CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

SEPTEMBER 30, 2011 AND 2010

Note 1 - Description of the Organization

The accompanying consolidated financial statements include the following entities hereinafter referred to as "the Organization":

National Center for Healthy Housing, Inc.

The National Center for Healthy Housing, Inc. (the Center), formerly known as the National Center for Lead-Safe Housing, Inc., was founded in 1992 to bring the housing, environmental, and public health communities together to combat childhood lead poisoning. The Center is a nonprofit organization committed to developing and promoting practical methods to protect children from environmental health hazards in their homes while preserving affordable housing.

Until April 2007, the Center was a supporting organization of the Alliance for Healthy Homes, a nonprofit organization with similar activities and programs. The relationship was legally terminated.

Healthy Housing Solutions, Inc.

The Center's wholly-owned Subsidiary, Healthy Housing Solutions, Inc. (Solutions), was incorporated as a Maryland for-profit stock corporation on November 10, 2003. Solutions is engaged in activities similar to that of the Center and was organized to support the Center's mission through fee-for-service work.

Note 2 – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

- (a) Basis of Accounting The financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. Accordingly, revenues are recognized when earned and expenses are recognized when incurred.
- (b) Principles of Consolidation The consolidated financial statements have been prepared for the Organization as described previously. All significant intercompany transactions have been eliminated.
- (c) Estimates The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

NOTES TO CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Note 2 – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

- (d) Cash and Equivalents The Organization considers all highly liquid investments purchased with an original maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.
- (e) Grants and Other Receivables Grants and other receivables are recorded net of an allowance for uncollectible receivables, based on management's evaluation of outstanding accounts receivable at year end. Grants and other receivables beyond one year are discounted to reflect the present value of the grant of the receivable. The Center has grants and cooperative agreements with U.S. Government agencies, various state agencies, and other private sources. Management anticipates that all grant and other receivables will be collected in full, and therefore, has not established an allowance for doubtful accounts.
- (f) Gifts and Bequests of Property Gifts and bequests of property are recorded at the earlier of the date received or when the bequest is no longer subject to probate and its value can be reasonably estimated. Gifts and bequests are valued at their estimated fair market value on the date they are recorded.
- (g) Fixed Assets Furniture and equipment are reported at cost if purchased and, if donated, at the approximate fair market value at the date of donation. Assets are depreciated over the estimated life using the straight line method. It is the policy of the Organization to capitalize equipment costing over \$1,000 and having a useful life of over one year. Depreciation expense for the years ended September 30, 2011 and 2010 amounted to \$4,532 and \$4,365, respectively.
- (h) Functional Allocation of Expenses The costs of providing the various programs and other activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the Consolidated Statement of Functional Expenses. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services benefited.
- (i) Donated Services and Materials Contributions of services are recognized if the services received create or enhance nonfinancial assets or require specialized skills, and are provided by individuals possessing those skills, and would typically need to be purchased if not provided by donation. Contributed services and promises to give services that do not meet the above criteria are not recognized. During the years ended September 30, 2011 and 2010, the Center did not receive any donated materials or services subject to the recognition criteria.

Note 2 – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

(j) Net Assets – the Center reports information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted, temporarily restricted, and permanently restricted.

Unrestricted

Unrestricted net assets represent resources over which the Board of Directors has discretionary control and are used to carry out operations of the Center in accordance with the bylaws.

Temporarily Restricted

Temporarily restricted net assets represent grants and contributions, which have been restricted by donors for specific programs or activities. Restrictions, which have been met by the passage of time or expenditure of net assets, are reported as revenues released from restrictions on the statement of activities. Restricted grants and contributions that are received and released in the same reporting period are recognized as unrestricted grants and contributions. For the years ended September 30, 2011 and 2010 the Center received \$500,000 and \$160,000, respectively, in restricted grants and contributions.

Permanently Restricted

Permanently restricted net assets result from contributions whose use is limited by donor-imposed stipulations that neither expire by passage of time nor can be fulfilled or otherwise removed by the Center's actions. As of September 3), 2011 and 2010, the Center has no permanently restricted net assets.

Note 3 - Short-Term Bank Borrowings

Solutions has a \$50,000 revolving line of credit with M&T Bank. Borrowings under the line of credit bear interest at the prime rate plus one point five percent (1.5%), (four point seventy-five percent (4.75%) as of September 30, 2011 and 2010). The line of credit is secured by substantially all of Solutions' assets and is guaranteed by the Center. As of September 30, 2011 and 2010 the outstanding borrowings under the line of credit amounted to \$40,149 and \$40,000, respectively. Interest expense amounted to \$2,077 and \$716 for the years ended September 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively.

The Center has a \$100,000 revolving line of credit with M&T Bank. Borrowings under the line of credit bear interest at the prime rate plus one point five percent (1.5%), (four point seventy-five percent (4.75%) as of September 30, 2011 and 2010). There was no balance due under this line of credit as of September 30, 2011 and 2010.

Note 4 - Pension Plan

The Organization has a 401(k) plan that permits voluntary contributions by employees of the Center and its Subsidiary. The plan covers all eligible employees who meet its eligibility requirements. The Plan provides for employer matching contribution of one hundred percent (100%) of elective deferrals up to three percent (3%) of eligible compensation and fifty percent (50%) of elective deferrals from three percent (3%) to five percent (5%) of eligible compensation. In addition, the plan allows discretionary contributions on an annual basis in amounts determined by the Organization's management. For the years ended September 30, 2011 and 2010, the Organization made matching contributions of \$38,195 and \$39,979, respectively and discretionary contributions of \$19,017 and \$17,595, or two percent (2%) of eligible compensation to the Plan.

Note 5 - Income Taxes

National Center for Healthy Housing, Inc.

The Center is recognized by the Internal Revenue Service as a non-profit organization under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code as other than a private foundation. Therefore, contributions to the Center are tax deductible under Section 170 of the Internal Revenue Code.

The Center follows the guidance of the Financial Accounting Standards Board Accounting Standards Codification 740-10, Accounting for Uncertainty of Income Taxes which clarifies the accounting for the recognition and measurement of the benefits of individual tax position in the financial statements, including those non-profit organizations. Tax positions must meet a recognition threshold of more-likely-than-not in order for the benefit of those tax positions to be recognized in the financial statements.

NOTES TO CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Note 5 - Income Taxes (Continued)

The Center analyzes tax positions taken, including those related to the requirements set forth in Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c) to qualify as a tax exempt organization, activities performed by volunteers and board members, the reporting of unrelated business income, and its status as a tax-exempt organization under Maryland statute. The Center does not know of any tax benefits arising from uncertain tax positions and there was no effect on the Center's financial position or changes in net assets as a result of ar alyzing its tax positions. Fiscal years ending on or after September 30, 2008 remain subject to examination by federal and state authorities.

Healthy Housing Solutions, Inc.

Solutions is taxed as a for-profit corporation under the Internal Revenue Code and applicable state statutes. The income of Solutions is subject to examination by federal and state taxing authorities. In the event of an examination of the income tax returns, the tax liability could be changed if an adjustment of income is ultimately determined by the taxing authorities.

Certain transactions of Solutions may be subject to accounting methods for federal income tax purposes that differ significantly from the accounting methods used in preparing the financial statements in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. Accordingly, the taxable income of Solutions reported for federal income tax purposes may differ from net income in these financial statements.

On October 1, 2010 Solutions adopted newly issued accounting rules that prescribe when to recognize and how to measure the financial statement effects, if any, of income tax positions taken or expected to be taken on its income tax returns. These new rules require management to evaluate the likelihood that, upon examination by relevant taxing jurisdictions, those income tax positions would be sustained.

Based on that evaluation, if it were more than fifty percent (50%) probable that a material amount of income tax would be imposed at the entity level upon examination by the relevant taxing authorities, a liability would be recognized in the accompanying balance sheet along with any interest and penalties that would result from that assessment. Should any such penalties and interest be incurred, Solution's policy would be to recognize them as operation expenses.

Based on the results of management's evaluation, adoption of the new rules did not have a material effect on Solution's financial statements. Further, no interest or penalties have been accrued or charged to expense as of September 30, 2011 or the year then ended.

Solutions income tax returns are subject to examination by taxing authorities for a period of three (3) years from the date they are filed. As of September 30, 2011 the following tax years are subject to examination.

Note 6 - Income Tax Provision

Note 7 – Concentration of Risk

The Organization receives a substantial portion of its revenue from federal grants and contracts, primarily from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services and the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. If a significant reduction of this funding occurs, it may have a significant impact on the Organization's programs. For the years ended September 30, 2011 and 2010, direct and indirect federal grants and contracts represented eighty percent (80%) and seventy-seven percent (77%) of the Organization's total revenue and support, respectively. Management does not anticipate any significant reduction in future funding from federal agencies.

The Organization maintains cash balances in a financial institution which is insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation for amounts up to \$250,000 for the year; 2011 and 2010, respectively. The Organization is exposed to concentrations of credit risk at times when cash balances exceed the FDIC limit. The Organization has not experienced any losses and believes they are not exposed to significant risk.

Note 8 – Leases and Rent Expenses

In November 2006, the Center entered into a lease agreement for office space in Columbia, Maryland. The lease term commenced November 1, 2006 for a period of sixty (60) months, expiring on October 31, 2011. Monthly payments for base rent in 2011 and 2010 under this agreement amounted to \$7,790 and \$7,738, respectively. The lease provides for annual escalation charges and monthly operating expense charges in excess of base-year operating expenses.

In August 2011, the Center entered into a new lease on this property commencing November 1, 2011 for a period of forty-eight (48) months, expiring on October 31, 2015. Initial monthly base rent is \$7,634 for the first twelve months. The lease provides for annual three percent (3%) escalation charges and monthly operating expense charges in excess of the new base-year operating expenses.

Effective June 30, 2009, the Center entered into a month-to-month lease for office space in Washington, DC. The lease is terminable at the will of either party at any time upon thirty (30) days advanced written notice. The lease was terminated on April 30, 2011. Monthly payments on this lease were \$1,300.

In May 2011, the Center entered into a space sharing agreement with another non-profit organization in Washington, DC. The agreement commenced May 1, 2011 for a period of twelve (12) months, expiring on April 30, 1012. Monthly rent payments are \$3,500. Subsequent to year-end, the agreement was amended in April 2012, to extend the term through April 30, 2013 and increase the monthly rent payments to \$3,640 effective May 1, 2012.

Note 9 - Compliance with Grantor or Donor Restrictions

Financial assistance from federal, state, and local governmental entities in the form of grants are subject to special audit. Such audits could result in claims against the Organization for disallowed costs or noncompliance with grantor restrictions. No provision has been made for any liabilities that may arise from such audits since the amounts, if any, cannot be determined at this date.

Note 10 – Merger

On January 15, 2010, the Boards of the Center and The Alliance for Healthy Homes (the Alliance), a 501(c)(3) Organization, voted to pursue a merger of the two Organizations. On February 22, 2011 the merger was finalized. Under the terms of the merger, the Alliance transferred all of its assets, liabilities, property and obligations to the Center.

Note 11 – Subsequent Events

In preparing these financial statements, the Organization has evaluated events and transactions for potential recognition or disclosure through May 14, 2012 the date the financial statements were available to be issued.
